The man of sorrows — who turns our sorrow into Joy

Introduction:

- 1. Sometimes we see an aspect of Jesus we don't think of very often
- 2. Why does Isaiah describe our Savior as a man of sorrows acquainted with grief?

I. A MAN OF SORROWS

A. A PROPHESY OF JESUS (53:1-2)

- 1. Although Isaiah is written over 7 centuries before the birth of Jesus...
- 2. This prophesy is given in PAST, PRESENT and FUTURE Tense!
- 3. Because God is Eternal He Created Time and is Outside of Time and not bound by Time
- 4. The Creator of Time and Space Entered Time and Space Just as the Author of Time and Space Promised!

B. HIS ARRIVAL (53:2)

- 1. The Time of Jesus Arrival Was Like a Political, Religious and Moral Desert
 - a) Israel were Ruled By a Depraved Tyrant Herod the Great
 - b) Herod was Ruled by Depraved Caesars in Rome
 - c) The People Were Ruled by Corrupt Religious Leaders at home
 - d) A Corrupt Priesthood controlled by Tradition rather than committed to Truth
- 2. I was In these Dry Conditions that a carpenter from Nazareth began sharing the Water of Life...

C. HIS APPEARANCE (53:2)

- 1. Isaiah gives the most detailed description of Jesus physical appearance in all the Bible
 - a) NASB: "He has no stately form or majesty That we should look upon Him, Nor appearance that we should be attracted to Him."
- 2. Jesus was Humble and raised in a humble home...
 - a) He was not a Politician or a Hollywood Celebrity, or the "Life of the Party" type
 - b) He did not appeal to people by some advantage of physical appearance
 - c) EX: In the movie "Jesus of Nazareth" the actor refused to blink his eyes in any scene of the movie. It give an unnatural stare that makes the viewer uncomfortable.
- 3. Our Culture is So Appearance Oriented Today that Sometimes we think we need to "dress up" the gospel to make it more attractive.
 - a) A Marketing Make-over to Make Christ and His Church More Attractive
 - b) A Different Gospel—A New and Improved Gospel because the True Gospel is Not Attractive Enough to Our Worldly Way of Thinking.
 - c) If the Truth isn't good Enough For Us Then Nothing Will Be Good Enough

D. HE WAS DESPISED AND REJECTED (53:3)

- 1. Jesus left the glory of heaven to be born in a manger for animals because there was no room in the lnn (Lk 2:7)
- 2. He came to His own and His own received Him not
- 3. Even During His Ministry He Was Despised and Rejected by the Scribes, the Pharisees, the Chief priests, and religious rulers.

E. <u>HE WAS A MAN OF SORROWS</u> (53:3)

- 1. Jesus Experienced Both Physical and Emotional sorrow
 - a) Jesus Wept Over Jerusalem
 - b) Jesus Wept at the Death of His Friend Lazarus (John 11:32-36)
 - c) Jesus Groaned within His Spirit and Was Troubled
- 2. Jesus was a Man of Sorrow—But NOT For Himself—but For the Suffering of Humanity...
 - a) He Had Compassion and Healed the Sick, Gave Sight to the Blind, Made the Lame
 Walk and Raised the Dead.
- 3. His Sorrow is a Direct Result of His Compassion and Love!

II. AQUATINTED WITH GRIEF

A. JESUS WAS WELL AQUATINTED WITH GRIEF

- 1. Grief is a deep sadness an anguish of the heart.
 - a) Grief is what we feel when we experience loss
 - b) It washes over us in waves and when we think it's over it returns
 - c) It makes us feel like were going crazy—but that's what grief feels like

B. JESUS CARRIED THE WIEGHT OF THE WORLD IN HIS HEART

- 1. A mother grieving the death of her baby said, "the hole in my heart was so deep that I couldn't see the bottom."
- 2. Imagine the Grief of Every Lost Child in the World...

This is the Deep Sadness and Anguish of the heart that Jesus Carried.

- a) (Isaiah 53:4) "Surely He has borne our griefs And carried our sorrows; Yet we esteemed Him stricken, Smitten by God, and afflicted.
- 3. This is why Jesus wept over Jerusalem... (Matthew 23:37)

C. <u>JESUS CARRIED THE SINS OF THE WORLD TO THE CROSS</u>

- 1. Jesus experienced intense sorrow and grief leading to the cross...
 - a) But Even Greater than the Physical Suffering...
 - b) Even Greater than the Weight of the World on His Heart...
 - c) Jesus Carried the Sins of the World to the Cross
- 2. As Isaiah Prophesied (Isaiah 53:3-7)
- 3. Jesus Paid Our Debt in Full at the Cross

III. IMPLICATIONS FOR US

A. SORROW AND GRIEF ARE A PART OF THE HUMAN EXPERIENCE

- 1. Atheistic Materialism cannot explain Human Consciousness, or Moral Conscience or Human Emotions.
 - a) But The Bible Reveals that God who is Eternal Spirit Created us in His Image
 —with Personality, Intellect, Will, Emotions and Moral Conscience
 - b) <u>Jesus Wept</u> and so will we, <u>Jesus Grieved</u> and so will we, <u>Jesus Experienced Sorrow</u> of the heart and so will we
 - c) because we were created in the image of God.

2. So GRIEF is NORMAL, it is NATURAL and it is Even NECESSARY

- a) JOB Experienced Grief—because he lost everything, even his family. (Job 6:2–3a)
- b) DAVID described his grief (Ps 6:6-7a) as his pillow soaked with tears in the night—and his soul cast down.
- c) Grief Sometimes it Makes People Feel Like They Are Going Crazy
- d) It Washes Over Us Like a Wave pummeling us... then it recedes and we think were ok but then it washes over us again unexpectedly, the recedes
- 3. THERE ARE MANY MYTHS ABOUT GRIEF Here are a few... 1
 - a) MYTH 1: People with strong faith don't Grieve.
 - (1) But we see that Jesus was Well Aquatinted with Grief
 - b) MYTH 2: A Strong person should be able to get through a loss without showing emotion.
 - (1) Yet We Know That Jesus Wept at the grave of His friend Lazarus
 - c) MYTH 3: Crying is a sign of Weakness
 - (1) Weeping is a normal and natural response to deep sadness.
 - (2) We Weep Because We Care, we love, and we have experienced loss.
 - (3) Tears are words that can't be spoken, but must come out of our heart
 - d) MYTH 4: If You Feel or Express Intense Feelings You are Losing Control of Yourself.
 - (1) CS Lewis lost his wife to cancer, and later he wrote: "No one ever told me that grief felt so much like fear."
 - e) MYTH 5: Grieving Only Lasts a Short Time
 - f) MYTH 6: Continuing to talk about the loss, or tragedy or the person who died only makes the pain last longer.
 - g) MYTH 7: A Strong person should be able to Deal with Grief Alone
 - h) MYTH 8: After a Tragic loss or a loved one has died, you can never be happy again...

Grief is difficult enough w/o the pressure of unrealistic expectations that only make it harder.

B. BUT EVEN IN SORROW—JESUS HAD HOPE

- 1. Even in spite of all the Sorrows and the Grief Jesus Carried...
 - —He Had Hope Keeping Him Focused on the Plan of God (Hebrews 12:1-2)
- 2. Even In Our Sorrow and Grief We Too Have Hope Because of Jesus
- 3. Even Our Grief can bring us closer to God
- 4. We Can Keep Going—Even in Pain—For the Hope that is Set Before Us
 The Hope of Eternal Life (Titus 1:2)

C. JESUS WENT TO THE CROSS TO TURN OUR SORROW INTO JOY

- 1. (John 16:19–22) Only Jesus Can Turn Our Sorrow into Joy!
- 2. Mary Went to the Tomb early before light but it was empty, Jesus was gone.
 - a) She was in tears and couldn't recognize Jesus alive from the dead.
 - b) She Thought he was the gardener and said, if You've taken away my Lord please tell me where you have laid Him.
 - c) Jesus said, Mary and she recognized it was Jesus.
- 3. Her tears obscured her vision so she could not recognize Jesus!
 - a) Her Sorrow and Tears Obscured her vision
 - b) But Jesus Turned Her Sorrow into Joy!
- 4. We might describe grief as a broken heart...
 - a) Jesus knows what that is like and is able to comfort us (Psalm 34:18-19)
 - b) Weeping may endure for a night, But joy comes in the morning. (Psalm 30:5)

CONCLUSION:

- 1. Jesus was the man of Sorrows—who turns our sorrow into Joy
- 2. He is near the broken hearted
- 3. And comforts the afflicted

(John 16:22) Therefore you now have sorrow; but I will see you again and your heart will rejoice, and your joy no one will take from you.

Mt 5:6 4 Blessed are those who mourn, For they shall be comforted.
